Soup Kitchen

On **Saturday 5 August**, when we are holding our **Gift Day**, it is also the usual day for collecting items for the Soup Kitchen. Therefore, Soup Kitchen items will be collected as normal, at the same time, and the theme of giving is very appropriate as we ask for support for our Church, which in turn gives very valuable support to the Southport Soup Kitchen.

Church Finances: Where the Money Goes

I thought it might be helpful to explain how the **Maintenance of the Ministry Fund** operates.

All URC churches pay monthly into the fund, which pays for Ministers' salaries, pensions and training, plus a contribution to the administration of the church at national level.

In 2023 the full cost was £375 per member (the same as last year), but as we are in a Local Ecumenical Partnership (URC and Baptist), a ten per cent discount applies, so we pay £337.50 per member. This is £6.49 per member per week.

So, with eighteen members this year, we will pay £6075 into the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund.

The five URC churches in the Southport and Formby area also pay, according to size, into the Team Ministry Fund. This year our contribution is £972 (£81 per month). The fund pays for telephone costs, car allowance, Ministers' expenses, stationery, and a proportion of manse expenses. When Hilary joined us the costs increased, so when Peter retires next year, the Team Ministry costs will decrease.

Gas and Electricity:

As we have just come to the end of our existing fixed price contracts, and moved to new suppliers, it is worth an explanatory note.

If we use the same amount of gas and electricity as last year, then our fuel bills will increase from £2203 pa to just over twice the cost at £4860 pa which means we have to find another £51 per week.

This increase is in line with the increase in both the domestic and commercial market. We are classified as a small business, so we are in the commercial sector for prices.

People

The deaths were reported of David Swift and Elaine Frost. On a lighter note, Beverly, Chris and Becky Bush were received into membership, with Bev soon becoming an elder.

The wedding took place of Joanna Green and Stewart Fraser. Church members enjoyed a day trip to Llangollen, organised by Joan Green with Stewart driving the coach! Barbara Henderson took care of the Hall Lettings, and Alan and Jenny organised the November 5th fireworks in the garden followed by a BBQ. Visits were organised to The Meadows with our harvest gifts, and at Christmas "a very good and enthusiastic choir sang carols with the residents under the musical direction of Colin Ambrose and Alison Hayhurst". The Quinquennial Report on the condition of our buildings was received, and was classified as a "tremendous challenge".

Ladies Group

Jenny organised a Beetle Drive, and Christine Holford's Tai Chi classes were well attended. An auction of "gifts brought back from holidays", and another un-named event together raised £162 for the Macmillan World's Largest Coffee Morning. Peter Sutcliffe described the vineyards of south west France from picking the fruit to making the wine, plus wine tasting of course!

Brownies

The 34th Southport (Ainsdale URC) Brownie Pack, to give it its full title, had a full roll of eighteen girls, plus six who went up to Guides. The highlight of the year was visiting Pizza Express in Southport, where they created their own pizzas to take home. Two other notable events were an evening on the dunes with the Sefton Coastal Rangers, and an Open Evening with a fashion show for the parents.

Rainbows

The Rainbows celebrated their tenth birthday, and had "a very exciting year" including meeting Rainbows from previous years. In November they won the Divisional Challenge Cup with an outstanding Nativity Collage and Christmas Card display.

Pre-School

A living willow dome and tunnel was woven in the back garden, which the children, parents and leaders said was a great asset. They took part in a "Sefton Safety in the Shade" programme. The Leaders reported that the rigours of the new Ofsted National Standards continued to test them, with 50% of staff now requiring NVQ Level 3 qualifications. To this end, all the staff continued to attend courses to extend their knowledge and skills. They also managed to run a Summer Playscheme in August on three days each week. As previously reported, in most years Pre-School made a considerable contribution to Church funds.

Stalwart women of the church

In a village near Cambridge in the mid- 16^{th} century lived a woman called Etheldreda Swan. When she died, she was not wealthy, but she left a will giving directions as to how her meagre funds were to be divided.

She left 7 pence to cover funeral expenses including 2 pence for bellringers. The tolling of the bell would have reminded her fellow villagers to say a prayer for her soul. She left her best bedcover and sheet to a chapel in her parish, where possibly they could have been made into altar coverings. She left one shilling for the church bells, one shilling to pay for candles, and one shilling for the high altar, as well as 20 pence for church repairs.

Thinking of early Tudor religion, we remember the great cathedrals still standing today, but across the country, the devotion of ordinary women sustained the day-to-day life of thousands of parish churches. Church accounts of the day show that women were just as active as men in church life, if not more so.

The view might be expressed that a good Christian woman should be meek, silent and obedient, but early Tudor villages and towns were full of energetic, opinionated women organising and shaping church affairs.

So what's different today! **Jenny**

Notes from Team Meeting 15th July 2023 at Ainsdale Village Church Representatives from the 5 Churches in the Team were present plus Revd Hilary Smith.

The meeting was facilitated by Revd Janice Hill

The meeting began with the two Bible Readings below and prayer.

The Greatest Commandment Matthew 22:37-40

"Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

The Great Commission Matthew 28:19-20

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'

This was followed by a recap of the the Being Church initiative introduced at the last meeting held on 3rd June. Each Church was then asked to give a verbal report on progress to date.

After the presentations, there was a time of reflection and discussion and the key points from this discussion were noted....

- * The common ground between all the Team Churches was acknowledged.
- * It was noted that all Churches noted Worship as the key purpose of the Church followed by Community.
- * The different strengths within the Team were acknowledged and celebrated
- * It was suggested that each Church should maybe focus on its strengths rather than try to do everything
- * The need to focus on high school age young people was noted.
- * It was also acknowledged that "one size" worship doesn't fit all and we need to look at focusing on specific groups/ages.
- * One final point ...the number of people and the age of people to do things is a problem we may need to look at paid workers as younger people in our congregations have a lot to do and can't offer the time.

During the discussion, we noted the changes in society and that many people lack information or experience of the Christian Faith so we need to look at smaller steps to encourage people on the journey of faith.

Quite a damning, depressing remark that I could sort of relate to, saddened as I felt at the time. Not so much now though, I feel a new energy, vitality, and enthusiasm not just within individual churches but the URC itself. One that we need to be swept up in, even if you are feeling 'old and tired,' as we all do from time to time!

PRAY, every day that God will lead both you, your church, and its leaders as we take our baby steps into where God is leading us. If you are running low on the energy and enthusiasm, then think glass half-full and see where it leads. The recent 'Being Church,' was a good start, you can read all about it in the relevant article. I have recently done on-line training in church resilience, this also included bits of the personal and community resilience which I unfortunately missed.

This I found to be so instructive and eye-opening, I learnt so much from what is going on in other URC churches and centres, talking with people from other synods, we all have things to work through and learn from. Certainly, gave me so much to think on and put into practice in my church, youth work and personal life.

The leader of this training works out of a Church in Cambridge within the Eastern Synod, where a Solidarity Hub has been set up partly in response to the needs and desires of those, he met during his chaplaincy work. To create safe spaces for many who are LGBTQ+ and/or neuro divergent. Certainly, something I have become increasingly aware of during my working life and now in working with young people, not to mention life in general.

One of his comments at the start was,

Lots of churches often say, 'All are welcome,' (all are human, all have something in common.) For many though they would say, 'We are all different, will I be welcome just as I am?' I hope so, that is what we strive for, safe spaces for everyone.

Be who you are and accept everyone as they are.
