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Dear friends.

I recently met up with an old university friend who I hadn't seen for 39 years, as he moved to Germany just after the last time I saw him and so has now lived in Germany for much longer than he lived in England. It was good to see him again, and to reflect on how much has changed - and how much hasn't.

Back in the 1980s we both knew each other's parents, were part of the same friendship group in our late teens, and are now both parents in our turn, as the wheels of time have ground slowly on, and life has kept going forward – at an everfaster pace. There are bonds in the length of time that we have known each other, even after many years of little or no communication. Steve looked different to how I remembered him, which is hardly surprising after all that time, but he had exactly the same mannerisms – same sentence structure, exposition of facts, and booming laugh, which meant that if I'd been in the same room as him without knowing it was him, I would still have recognised him.

In the Easter story I've always been interested in the accounts of the disciples both recognising and not quite recognising the risen Christ. The appearance in the locked room, on the road to Emmaus and on the sea shore, all speak of the joy and delight at the reunion with a lost friend, one who had shared so much with them but who is now both familiar and strange, as if the experience has done more for him than for them; as if another dimension has been at play – which of course it has.

We know that people who travel in space age differently to those who remain subject to earth's gravity, and we don't have to go all the way up to space to appreciate the new perspective that we have when we "rise above" the earth. I remember one plane trip, coming in to land at Manchester on a dark Bonfire night evening, and flying over the Wirral where I noticed little tiny but very pretty explosions of light as people let off fireworks, that no doubt looked spectacular to them but looked very small fry to me!

From there it's only a short leap to an understanding that the Kingdom of Heaven has different rules to those of the earth, and that Jesus can be with us whenever we call on him. Perspective is very important, and our amazing God is master of all time and space, which is of great comfort when we feel that it's all getting too much.

I pray that the risen Christ is meeting with you again, and that you recognise him when he does; and even more, that we will all make a point of seeking him as we look for signs of light, warmth and renewal in the gift of summer that is with us just now.

Notes from the Archives - Part 16: 1908 and 1909

We continue with extracts from the minutes of the monthly church meetings, which covered the years from 1900 to 1911. There is no mention of Deacons' Meetings in any of the records.

1908: Agreed that the Deacons enter upon a Contract with Singer Lee and Company to erect an iron building at the rear of the church, at a cost of not more than £200. Also agreed that the new building be named the Milton Hall to commemorate the 300th year of John Milton's birth. It was also agreed to form a committee to control the hire of the new building.

When Jen and I became members in 1972, the Large Hall was known as the Milton Hall, but we had no idea why, and no-one else did either, but now we know. Best known for his epic poem Paradise Lost, John Milton (1608 – 1694) was a poet and theologian. The poem retells the story of the creation from the Book of Genesis.

The iron building was purchased in kit form, known as a "Tin Tabernacle", and was erected by a local builder. These were popular with non-conformist churches and there are many examples around the country. There are modest foundations to our hall, but it is still here after 117 years, and giving faithful service to the church and local community. It has, of course, had a lot of TLC over recent years!

The following six extracts are from 1909:

The Women's Guild of Christian Service is mentioned, and it was still operating in 2007, a hundred years later.

"A discussion took place on the sparseness of the congregation at the morning service, so a special effort is required by the members".

"Mr Yates made a strong appeal for a better attendance at the Saturday night prayer meeting".

"It was agreed that an overdraft of £40 be obtained from the District Bank to pay for the new piano, and the old piano to be sold".

The congregation supported exchange visits of English clergy to Berlin in 1908, and a return visit of German clergy to London in 1909. "The purpose was to develop goodwill and friendship, and the earnest desire of peace between the two nations".

"The Congregational Union of England and Wales appealed to churches to raise a fund to secure a minimum stipend of £120 per annum for ministers. The Secretary was instructed to reply that when the burden of debt on the Milton Hall (our Large Hall) was removed from our shoulders, we would give the matter our healthy support".

Bible Sales on the rise

Apparently, according to a recent newspaper article, sales of the Bible have risen, despite a decline of interest in organised religion. It seems that Generation Z, those born from the late 1990s to the 2010s, are becoming more spiritual and looking at various sources, including the Bible.

There was an 87 per cent increase in sales between 2019 and 2024, according to SPCK Group, a Christian publishing company. It seems that we are at the centre of a significant cultural shift regarding matters of faith and religion, and atheism, once considered by modern society to be the view of most rational adults, no longer carries the same weight or appeal. Generation Z in particular are statistically far less likely to identify as atheists than their parents.

In January a survey found that 25% of Generation X, people born between 1965 and 1980 identified as atheist, making it the least religious generation. Atheism falls to 20% among millennials, born between 1981 and 1996, dropping to just 13% among Generation Z, born between 1997 and 2012.

The Bible Society says that some of the increased sales have come from young people buying the Bible themselves, parents buying it for their children and churches buying it for their youth groups.

The Good News Bible – The Youth Edition (2018) is the most popular edition, with sales having almost doubled since 2021. It contains explanations to help readers understand important Bible passages.



Community Garden

This has been a busy time for the gardeners. As well as having to water a lot (only with cans, not the hose), we had a plant and preserves sale on Tuesday 20th May. As always, Anne Hanley and others had worked hard to ensure there were plenty of plants available, and the proceeds came to a whopping £403! A magnificent result. It was agreed that a donation of £50 would be given to Christian Aid from this amount.

We were also given donations from Iris Whitaker, who donates the profits from her books about the history of Ainsdale, and from Ainsdale Women's Institute. It is really good for the gardeners to know that local people love the garden and are willing give it their financial support.

Also, at the plant sale, £88 was raised for Church funds from the provision of refreshments in the garden.

On Saturday 12^{th} and Sunday 13^{th} July, Ainsdale Civic Society will be hosting their annual Open Gardens Event, and the Community Garden will be officially open for visitors on the Saturday from 10.00 am -4.00 pm.

There will be another plant sale, and refreshments for visitors.

Following this, on Tuesday 15th July, the gardeners will be hosting a Thank You Coffee Morning in the garden (hopefully) for those people who had opened their gardens the previous weekend. This will run alongside the usual Church Coffee Morning, but the gardeners will provide the refreshments and do the work!

Then on every Friday we have our Warm Welcome Café, a free café for those who can't afford café prices and a great welcoming friendly place for anyone lonely who finds true friendship.

All of these are staffed by volunteers and prayer is the mainstay of all of them, both personal and those shared as in the café when everyone is prayed for. Volunteers are the core of all that we do to further God's kingdom here on earth. Led of course by our ministers.

Just received from TLG, ahead of our Lunch Club this week, Inspired by **Colossians 1:9-12**, from The Message Bible:

'Be assured that from the first day we heard of you, we haven't stopped praying for you, asking God to give you wise minds and spirits attuned to his will, and so acquire a thorough understanding of the ways in which God works. 
